#### February President's Message

Friends,

I have to admit, I didn't expect much from Rabbi Ishmael. After all, my only exposure to him had been the rather dry and hard to understand set of logic rules he gives for explaining Torah (p. 48 in our Siddur) and his horrible death at the hands of the Romans which we read on Yom Kippur (p. 382 in our Machzor). As I read about him, I found that he really speaks to me. He was a contemporary of the Rabbi Akiva, active in the time running up to the Bar Kochba rebellion (against the Romans, who else?) of 132-136 CE.

Akiva and Ishmael often had opposing views, just like Hillel and Shammai of a century earlier. Generally, Rabbi Akiva's views are more represented in the Mishna. Rabbi Ishmael was responsible for the Sifra, an exposition of Leviticus. Rabbi Akiva taught that every dot in the Torah has a meaning, that every word that is repeated must teach something different the second time around. Rabbi Ishmael taught that the Torah speaks with a human voice, that figures of speech may just be figures of speech and that the superficial meaning of the text is often more important than deep and hidden meanings. His rules of logic show that he looked for hidden meanings too, but it was a matter of degree. He wanted every ruling to be firmly anchored in the text. Incidentally, his rules of logic are not actually that hard to understand. The Birnbaum Siddur has a nice discussion with examples (there's a copy in the lectern at shul).

Another way that Akiva and Ishmael differed was in the place of Torah study in life. Akiva stayed away from his impoverished wife for decades in order to study. Ishmael taught that action is more important than study. He taught that the Torah says "you shall gather in your grain" (Deut. 11:14) meaning that you have to earn a livelihood, you can't just study all the time. We should live by the Torah, we find time to study, but we don't study all the time.

If you are looking to spend some time studying there are many ways to do it. You can study online. There are numerous talks and classes in our community. There are books everywhere. Our library was recently blessed with six boxes of books that were given away by the JCC library. These include a set of the Mishnah, the Midrash Rabbah, multiple tractates of the Talmud, and several history books. Our friends Paul Rosenfeld and Sylvia Rose got the books from the JCC and gave them to BHBI. If you'd like to look them over, you can see them on Shabbat or on Sunday morning, when the building is open. I'm considering opening the building at another time during the week as well. If you have a time you'd like to have access to the building for study on a regular basis, please let me know.

Please note that the next Jewish Muslim dialogue is coming up on February 9th at the U of Rochester chapel. We'll discuss Religion and Science. Please join us.
