February President's Message

Friends,

Last month we marked the beginning of the secular year. In Roman times January was called Ianuarius (the Month of Janus). It was designated the first month of the year in 450 BCE, and in 153 BCE the first day of the month was marked as the beginning of the year, which was when new Consuls took office during the Lusitanian War. Helping with the first month designation was Janus, the Roman god of new beginnings. (See Wikipedia and other sources on the internet) The tendentious Jewish connection to January 1st is that is the date that some Christians commemorate the circumcision of their founder. For some, it's also the first shedding of his blood by the "establishment" of the time, but we won't get into that here.

There are four New Years in the Jewish calendar. In addition to Rosh Hashana on Tishrei 1, there is Tu B'Shevat, Pesach on Nisan 1 in the spring, and the beginning of the month of Elul for the tithe of domestic animals. Here we are concerned with Tu B'Shevat – literally the 15th of Shevat.

"And when you shall come into the land, and shall have planted all manner of trees for food, then you shall count the fruit thereof as forbidden; three years shall it be as forbidden unto you; it shall not be eaten. And in the fourth year all the fruit thereof shall be holy, for giving praise unto the LORD. But in the fifth year may you eat of the fruit thereof, that it may yield unto you more richly the increase thereof: I am the LORD your G-d." Leviticus 19, 23-25.

Tu B'Shevat is not mentioned in the Torah, but it is in the Mishna where the celebration of "giving praise to the Lord" is set as a formal observance. The early rabbis observed that Shevat is when the rainy season is mostly over and the trees are beginning to grow. All the other New Years begin on the 1st of the month, so why the 15th of Shevat for trees? Shammai recommended Shevat 1 and Hillel selected the 15th. Shammai reasoned that the 1st was associated with the sun and the Tree of Life. Hillel took the middle of the month, when the moon is in its glory. For Hillel, that was when the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil would become only the Tree of Good because evil would no longer exist in the age of the Messiah. Guess who won? Poor Shammai.

In the Middle Ages Tu B'Shevat was rediscovered by Jewish mystics and in the 17th century the form of the Pesach seder was emulated to create the Tu B'Shevat seder. In the present era, it has enjoyed a revival as a holiday that links Jews with the land of Israel and as a Jewish celebration of the environment.

We join Temple Beth Am for a Tu B'Shevat seder, brunch and Siyum (celebrating completing a tractate in the Talmud) on February 9 at 11:00 AM in the Beth Am Social Hall, TBK Room 106. Please see page 4 in this Bulletin for details, to make a reservation, and for fruits to bring and share at the seder.

We also join Beth Am at TBK for Shabbat Across America on Erev Shabbat, February 28 at 5:30 PM for dinner and services. Again, please see page 4 for details, reservations, and cost. Please offer to help with preparation and cleanup.
