## May President's Message

Friends,

There is a famous bilingual Hebrew-English riddle. When G-d plays tic-tac-toe with the people of Israel, does G-d play the "X" or the "O"? The answer: G-d takes "X", because "HaShem oz l'amo yitayn" (G-d gives his people "oz", which means strength). I recently came across the most brilliant piece of bilingual word play I had ever heard of. I was reading a biographical sketch of a medieval Italian Rabbi named Moses ben Mordecai Bassola (1480-1560). He was a noted Kabbalist and traveler. He wrote a book about his journey to Jerusalem in 1520, which served as a guide book for people traveling to the Holy Land. There was mention of his son Azriel, also a Rabbi, who was teacher to another, better known Rabbi, Leon de Modena (1571-1648). Leon de Modena lived in Venice and was a child prodigy who became a popular author, poet and lecturer, including lecturing in Latin to Christian scholars. He was tragically addicted to gambling, which led to a life of precarious circumstances. One of his poems, written at age 13 is the eulogy to Rabbi Azriel Bassola. It is written in both Hebrew and Italian and it makes sense in either language! You can see it online at http://www.jewishencyclopedia.com/articles/2625-basilea-basila-basola-basola-basola. I am repeatedly amazed at the brilliance of our ancestors. This is why I read so much history.

#### WHAT IS LAG B'OMER AND HOW IS IT CELEBRATED?

The Hebrew letters lamed gimel (lag for short) stand for the number 33 and thus Lag b'Omer designates the 33<sup>rd</sup> day of the counting of the Omer (which we are instructed to count each day to mark the week of weeks between Passover and Shavuot). In the 2<sup>nd</sup> century BCE, 24,000 students and disciples of Rabbi Akiva (ancient Israel's greatest sage) died mysteriously during the days following Passover. Thus, to recall this tragedy, traditionally the Omer period is treated as a time of semi-mourning during which one is not supposed to celebrate happy occasions like weddings or even to listen to music. However, on Lag b'Omer, Rabbi Akiva's students stopped dying, and thus that specific day became a day of celebration. Additionally, one of Rabbi Akiva's most outstanding disciples, Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, the author of the Zohar, later passed away on Lag b' Omer and had asked that the anniversary of his death be celebrated as a happy day. Traditionally, in Israel Lag b' Omer is celebrated with bonfires. Lag b'Omer falls on May 7<sup>th</sup> this year.



## HOW DO WE CUSTOMARILY OBSERVE SHAVUOT?

Shavuot, the festival marking the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai, is one of the 3 major festivals in the Jewish year (the others being Passover and Sukkot). It is customary to study Torah on Shavuot and many congregations have all night learnatons. On the morning of Shavuot, the 10 commandments are read from the Torah. Synagogues and homes are traditionally decorated with fresh flowers to mark the joyous occasion. We also customarily eat a dairy meal as the first meal on Shavuot.
