February President's Message

Friends:

Napoleon Bonaparte is supposed to have said "History is written by the winners". (Some say he didn't, but someone certainly said it.) Donald Trump is all about winning, but this article isn't about Trump. This article is about a "loser" who wrote history.

I have just started reading The Antiquities of the Jews, by Flavius Josephus. Known most commonly as Josephus, he was a Jewish historian who lived at the time of the Jewish war against Rome. He wrote an account of the destruction of Jerusalem and he wrote the first popular history of Judaism. Josephus was not a shrinking violet. In fact, his biography makes him sound like a bit of a braggart. He was born Yosef ben Mattityahu haCohen in Jerusalem in about 37 CE. He claimed descent from Yonathan the brother of Judah Maccabee. He says he was consulted as an expert on ritual as a teenager and that he spent three years living with an ascetic hermit in the desert. Despite being a priest, he identified himself as a Pharisee. The priests tended to support the Sadducees who were focused on the Temple ritual, rather than the Pharisees who were more focused on issues of righteousness. Years ago, I read in a history of religion (I wish I could remember which one), that there are only two men in all of literature who are recorded as identifying themselves as Pharisees: Josephus and Saul of Tarsus (known to Christians as St. Paul).

In 64 CE, Josephus went to Rome to negotiate for the release of some priests held hostage by Emperor Nero. With the favor of Nero's wife, his mission was a success. He returned to Judaea in 66 CE, just in time for the outbreak of war against Rome. He was made the Jewish military commander of the Galilee, despite being in favor of compromise with Rome (a common attitude among the Pharisees). He fought General Vespasian, who besieged and destroyed Yodefat (Jotapata in Greek). Josephus somehow survived the battle and the suicide pact of the remnant of the garrison. When brought in chains before Vespasian, he predicted that Vespasian would be Emperor. Two years later in 69 CE, Vespasian became Emperor, freed Josephus, and adopted him into the Flavian family, hence the name Flavius Josephus.

Josephus was present at the siege and destruction of Jerusalem by Titus (Vespasian's son), trying unsuccessfully to negotiate a settlement. He was hated by the Jews as a traitor, although Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakai, who surrendered to Titus and predicted that Titus would become Emperor (also correctly), was considered a hero. Josephus spent his last years mostly in Rome, writing. His two greatest works were the History of the Jewish War, in 7 books published in 75-79 CE and the Antiquities of the Jews, in 20 books published about 93 CE. In the War he extolled Roman military power, and apparently tried to prevent Jews in the diaspora from rebelling against Rome. His is one of the few non-Roman narratives of Roman military methods. He accurately portrayed what he knew about. His report of Masada was considered a fiction until Masada was discovered in modern times. In the Antiquities, he presented all of history from Adam to the recent war, with an emphasis on the rationalism of Jewish law and practices. In the process he preserved knowledge of Jewish history in second Temple times that would otherwise have been lost.

I don't think you could call Josephus a "winner". He wasn't exactly a "loser" either. I think he was a survivor, and I think history is written by the survivors.

Finally, we congratulate our own Dave Rogachefsky for receiving the Tikkun Olam Award from the JCC for his years of community service. Well done, Dave!
