THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF A TRUE HERO: DR. JANUSZ KORCZAK

Sunday, March 4, 10 AM – 12 Noon, The Forum at Nazareth College

Featuring Daan Braveman, JD (President of Nazareth College), Dr. Michael Dobkowski (Professor of Religious Studies at Hobart and William Smith Colleges), Dr. Jennie Schaff, Associate Professor of Education at Nazareth College) and Dr. Laura Streeter (Teacher at Penfield High School). Dr. Korczak was a well-known Christian physician, radio personality and director of two orphanages in pre-war Poland who was known as a champion of children's rights. He refused to leave the Jewish children who were in his care when they were to be sent to the concentration camps and he therefore accompanied them and perished. The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child was based on his work. The event will include panel presentations followed by questions, reflections and discussion. Free of charge.

AMY KRITZER: Sweet Noshings

Amy Kritzer developed *What a Jew Wanna Eat* as your source for home cooked (sometimes) kosher goodness. She has always enjoyed cooking and baking but needed a new goal and challenge to get back to her culinary roots. So she called up Bubbe Eleanor and pleaded for her to send her best recipes. Amy loved cooking these recipes so much she quit her corporate job and wet to culinary school at Le Cordon Bleu in Austin. Now she spends her days teaching cooking classes developing recipes, personal chefing, and food writing. Amy's recipes have been featured in *Cosmopolitan, Bon Appetit, The Today Show* and others. In 2012, she was a finalist in *Daily Candy's* Start Small Go Big Contest.

DAVID DALIN: Jewish Justices of the Supreme Court: From Brandeis to Kagan Wednesday, March 14, 7 pm; JCC Hart Theatre; \$10, \$8 for JCC Members

With a historian's eye and a rabbi's perspective, Dalin examines the lives, legal careers and legacies of the eight Jewish justices of the U.S. Supreme Court: Louis D. Brandeis, Benjamin Cardozo, Felix Frankfurter, Arthur Goldberg, Abe Fortas, and current justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Stephen G. Breyer and Elena Kagan. Did they encounter anti-Semitism as they navigated the legal profession? What kinds of relationships did they have with the presidents who appointed them? What political debates arose during their nominations? Dalin, a rabbi and scholar of American Jewish studies, has taught at numerous universities and formerly was a Taube Research Fellow at Stanford.

He has written, co-authored and edited 11 books.


SALE OF HAMETZ FORM

Note: If possible, all hametz, food not acceptable during Pesach (Passover), or materials containing such food – should be destroyed or given away before the holiday begins. Should this be impossible, the hametz should be stored in such a way that we are sure not to use it during the holiday and its actual ownership is transferred to non-Jew until the holiday ends. Please complete the form below and return it to Temple Beth Am, 2131 Elmwood Avenue, Rochester, NY 14618 to be received in the office no later than Friday, March 23rd.

KNOW ALL PEOPLE BY THESE PRESENTS: That I, the undersigned do here by make and appoint Aaron Marsh, Rabbinical Intern, my true and lawful representative to act in my place and stead, for me and in my name and in my behalf, to sell all *hametz* owned and possessed by me, knowingly or unknowingly, as stated in the Torah and defined by the sages of Israel (e.g., *hametz*; *hashash hametz* – suspect *hametz*; and all kinds of *ta'arovet hametz* – *hametz* mixtures); also, *hametz* that tends to harden and to adhere to the surface of pans, pots, or other cooking or eating utensils, of whatsoever nature, and to lease all places wherein the aforementioned *hametz* owned or possessed by me may be found, especially in the premises located at (your address)

Aaron Marsh has the full authority and power to sell said *hametz* and to lease said place or places where in said *hametz* may be found, upon terms and conditions as discretion dictates. Aaron Marsh has the full power and authority to assign or appoint a substitute or substitutes to act in my behalf with all the same powers and authority that I have invested in Aaron Marsh, and I do hereby ratify and confirm all that Aaron Marsh or a rabbinic substitute lawfully does or causes to be done by virtue of these presents.
