

July President's Message

Friends,

As I wrote in my message last month, this past year we have invested significantly in repairs to our building: the roof, the kitchen, plumbing, etc. Clearly we need a functioning building if we are to hold services and continue as a congregation in our present location. But there is not just the physical building to worry about, there is also our spiritual foundation. And the basis of our spirituality as Jews is in our Torah scrolls.

Last fall, when reading from one of our several Torah scrolls on Simchat Torah, we discovered that the scroll had several damaged letters, rendering the scroll unfit for ritual use. It is therefore incumbent upon us to repair the Torah scroll so that it can once again be put to the noble use for which it was intended. Unfortunately, such repairs are not cheap! But with every challenge comes an opportunity. Many of you might not know it, but the last of the 613 mitzvot that we are traditionally bound to obey is that, during one's lifetime, everyone should write his own Sefer Torah. Now we all recognize that not everyone, indeed only a very few, has sufficient technical training to accomplish this mitzvah directly. Fortunately, our sages have provided means by which we can all fulfill this mitzvah without having to personally take quill to parchment. According to Halachipedia (yes, there is such a thing) the Rambam asserts that one can fulfill the mitzvah of writing ones own Torah by writing or fixing just one letter in a scroll. And one can do that by providing funding for a trained scribe to act on one's behalf. Therefore, to give everyone the opportunity to complete this particular mitzvah, we are setting up a special fund raising drive to finance the repair of our damaged Torah. Please consider a generous donation to this effort!

Would that there was another, 614th commandment, that everyone was obliged to build his own freezer (or other major kitchen appliance). Alas, the freezer in our kitchen has failed and is beyond repair. We thus need to purchase a new freezer, and the cost for that is only slightly less than repairing our Torah scroll. As you see, we have many financial needs, often unexpected, and we depend on the generosity of our members to make ends meet. But the best way to contribute to our congregation, and to ensure its future, is to come to services and to bring a friend!

With July upon us I hope you are enjoying the weather and getting outdoors and relaxing. And if the weather is not always nice, you can take refuge inside at the many films coming up during the Rochester Jewish Film Festival. See rjff.org for the schedule.

A TALE OF 2 FASTS: THE 17TH OF TAMMUZ AND TISHA B'AV

The 17th of Tammuz

The fast of the 17th of the Hebrew month of Tammuz, known as Shivah Asar B'Tammuz, is the start of a threeweek mourning period for the destruction of Jerusalem and the two Temples.

The fast actually commemorates five tragic events that occurred on this date:

- 1. Moses broke the tablets when he saw the Jewish people worshipping the Golden Calf.
- 2. During the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem, the Jews were forced to cease offering the daily sacrifices due to the lack of sheep.
- 3. Apostomos burned the holy Torah.
- 4. An idol was placed in the Holy Temple.
- 5. The walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Romans in 69 CE after a lengthy siege. (Three weeks later, after the Jews put up a valiant struggle, the Romans destroyed the second Temple on the 9th of Av.) The Jerusalem Talmud maintains that this is also the date when the Babylonians breached the walls of Jerusalem on their way to destroying the first Temple.

Since we are not allowed to fast on Shabbat, this year we commemorate the fast of the 17th of Tammuz on the following day which corresponds to Sunday, July 1st.

Tisha b'Av (the 9th of Av)

The Tisha b'Av fast marks the date that the first and second temples in Jerusalem were destroyed. A number of other terrible things have happened to the Jewish people on Tisha b'Av including the defeat of the Bar Kochba rebellion against the Romans, the expulsion of Britain's Jews in 1290, the banishment of the Jews from Spain as part of the Inquisition in 1492, and the beginning of World War I which would subsequently lead to the rise of Nazi Germany. On Tisha b'Av we observe mourning rituals including not bathing or applying creams or lotions and not shaving. We sit on low stools and we recite the Book of Lamentations (Eicha) at Erev Tisha b'Av services.
