

March President's Message

Friends,

Purim is coming. This is perhaps the most quizzical of all our holidays. At once, it is a celebration of courage, survival, feminism, justice, the power of human action as a harbinger of miracles and more. There is a cacophony of overt and hidden themes – many of which appear contradictory. All through the story told in the Book of Esther, one senses the unseen Divine Hand at work, guiding the destiny of the mortal actors – and intervening when necessary.

One cannot avoid observing the echo of Purim themes in the present. There are still voices endorsing Haman's desire to put an end to the Jewish people. They employ the same justification and the same rhetoric that Haman used: "*There is a certain people scattered abroad and dispersed among the people in all the provinces of thy kingdom; and their laws are diverse from all people; neither keep they the king's laws: therefore it is not for the king's profit to suffer them. If it please the king, let it be written that they may be destroyed. And I will weigh out ten thousand talents of silver into the hands of those who have charge of the business."*

The contradictory behavior of the Persian king Achashverosh is similar to that of our own Head of State. Both exhibit boorish behavior, demeaning treatment of women, and accompany with and foster corrupt subordinates. That both men show transient – and self-serving – benevolence to Jews, does not efface their corruption.

The ancient rabbis cite the phrase *v'nahafoch hu* in the Megilla of Esther. It roughly translates to "Turning the world upside down" and refers to the reversal of fortunes as Haman's expected ascent and the decreed fall of the Jews were turned into the demise of Haman and his allies with the Jews emerging triumphant.

We join Beth David and Beth Am in our shul for the reading of the Megillah on March 9 at 7:00 PM.

Joseph Yudelson, Aline's father and second father to me, passed away early in February. Joe was an Associate Member. Joe touched and enriched countless lives. He was a great scientist. His many inventions include dry chemistry for film to photograph missiles in Cuba during the crisis in 1962, an easy to use kit for electrophoresis – still used today for hundreds of applications including DNA analysis and testing for antibiotics and vaccines. Just this week, one of the younger members of Joe's lab that he mentored – who he cajoled to take a leave of absence and get a Ph.D – wrote to tell us that he started using a catalyst in his work that Joe developed in 1973. But more than his career, Joe was a dedicated father, grandfather, advisor and friend to so many. His delightful and captivating story telling was legendary and rivals what we hear of Lincoln. Right up to the day before he left us, Joe intently inquired about the lives and welfare of his seven grandchildren.

As I write this, we hear of the passing of our long time and benevolent member, Philip Garver on Friday, February 21. Baruch Dayan HaEmet. Notice of the burial service and shiva will have been sent to members before you receive this.

ISRAELI NATIONAL ELECTIONS MARCH 2

On Monday, March 2, Israel will have elections for the 23rd Knesset. This will be an unprecedented third round of national elections within the span of just one year, the first having been held on April 9, 2019, and the second on September 17, 2019. In each case the election resulted in a standoff, with neither of the major political blocks succeeding to form a governing coalition of at least 61 Knesset members. It is unclear if this newest round will produce a more stable outcome. The main slates of candidates competing in the election are as follows, listed in the order of their strength in the current Knesset.

Blue and White: The new centrist party, lead by former IDF Chief of Staff Benny Gantz (33 seats).

Likud: Current governing right of center party, led by Benjamin Netanyahu (32 seats).

Joint List: Combined slate of four predominantly Arab parties, led by Ayman Odeh (13 seats).

Labor-Gesher-Meretz: In the April election, the left of center Labor Party joined in a common slate with Gesher, a libertarian-centrist party. In the current election they have now joined in a "marriage of convenience" with the left wing social democratic party Meretz, the goal being to ensure that left wing votes don't get "wasted" voting for a party that might not make the threshold for winning seats in the Knesset. The slate is led by Labor party head Amir Peretz (10 seats).

Shas: The Sephardic religious party, led by Aryed Deri (9 seats).

Yisrael Beiteinu: The secular nationalist party originally supported by Russian immigrants, led by Avigdor Lieberman. At one point it was thought this party was on the verge of irrelevance, only to see it return to prominence in these recent elections. Lieberman has become the "king maker" as his block has, so far, been vital to forming a governing coalition. Yet in the previous two elections he refused to side with Likud because of Netanyahu's corruption indictments and Likud's acquiescence to demands from the religious parties; but he also refused to side with Blue and White because of its refusal to join in a unity government headed by Netanyahu, and because of suggestions that Blue and White might accept support from the Joint List. The unwillingness of Lieberman to support either Netanyahu or Gantz is what has led to the new round of elections (8 seats).

United Torah Judaism: The Ashkenazi religious party, led by Yaakov Litzman (7 seats).

Yamina: A slate consisting of the New Right party, formed by Naftali Bennet and Ayelet Shaked when they broke away from the Jewish Home religious national party, now joined up with the Jewish Home and the National Union parties so as to prevent right wing votes from being wasted on a party that might not meet the electoral threshold; however the slate refused to also join with the extreme right Kahanist party, Otzmah Yehudit. The slate is the led by Bennet (7 seats).

What will be the outcome? We will have to wait to see. But as the election results become known, and parties start jockeying to form a governing coalition, March 17 will see the start of Prime Minister Netanyahu trial on charges of corruption. March will be an interesting month for Israeli politics.


CEMETERY PLOTS
