Friends,

Archeology

As I write this, we are preparing for Yom Kippur. That is a time for an intensive – even painful examination of our life over the past year. The Torah enjoins us to "afflict your souls." So we dig into ourselves. What have I done that was wrong? (And yes, what was right and good?) What was deliberate? What was accidental? How to make amends to those who I offended. All offenses to our fellow men and women are also offenses against G-d. We can atome for those by sincerely apologizing and offering restitution. But what of those sins that are solely against G-d? The rituals of Yom Kippur and our dedication to Torah point the way.

Exploring the past is the first step to atonement. A hint appears that something should be examined. Perhaps it is a fleeting regret that we kept in the back of our mind – an inadvertent slight against a colleague for which we intended to apologize – but never quite got around to . . .

In our daily prosaic lives, there are also opportunities to uncover and examine the past. By accident or by deliberation, we notice an unexplained mound, a depression, a stone or brick that has worked its way to the surface. So we pick at it and dig. After a while, the picking becomes a compulsion. More artifacts – a generous description to be sure – become visible. Ok, they're just old bricks from an abandoned walkway. How far does it go? What was its purpose and why did it fall into disuse? Years of rain and wind covered it with a thin layer of mud until it became a bed for undernourished grass with short roots.

The picking and scraping turned into what may be the first instance of using a string trimmer to conduct an archeological excavation. The brick walkway, installed about 1910 by the Hatch family who built the home that became our synagogue, led from Hawthorne Street past the porch up to at least the stairs leading to our building's rear entrance. Additional brick paths may exist under the asphalt that comprises our parking lot.

The uncovered path has a rustic look, which I hope will be found attractive. When we uncover our own faults this season and sincerely atone for them, we can emerge – perhaps not handsomely rustic – but more confident that we are on the path to becoming a better human being.

# **HOLIDAY SERVICES**

BHBI will be holding holiday morning services, beginning at 9 AM, for the 1st and 2nd days of Sukkot, Shmini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah. Services will be outside, weather permitting. BHBI will also join with Temple Beth Am for evening holiday services on Zoom at 6 PM. In keeping with Conservative halacha, you should join the Zoom service before the start of the holiday, and stay connected throughout the holiday, with your computer set not to go into sleep mode. The Beth Am Zoom connection will last 72 hours without expiring. We will also join with Beth Am on Zoom for morning services, if weather causes us to cancel our outdoor service (Beth Am morning services on Zoom will start at 9:30 AM, except for Simchat Torah, which will start at 9:00 AM). Note: due to the coronavirus situation, we regret that we will not be putting up the BHBI sukkah this year.

### **BHBI Shabbat Morning Services**

Services are now being held each Saturday morning at 9:30 AM, *outside* the building, weather permitting, canceled if it looks like rain. Everyone must wear a facial mask and keep 6 feet socially distanced. Please bring your own lawn chair, siddur, and chumash, if you are able. Folding chairs and books will be available for those who cannot bring their own. Hand sanitizer will be available. All are welcome! But to our sincere regret, in order to maintain safe social distancing, pre-bar/bat mitzvah age children should not attend. Unfortunately, for safety's sake, there will be no kiddush following services. Sunday morning services continue on zoom at 9:00 AM, see the shul website for the zoom link.


