# May's President's Message

Friends,

There have been at least 9 major revolutions in the last 250 years. Among them are the American War of Independence, the French Revolution, the Spanish American Wars of Independence, (early 1800s), the European Revolutions of 1848, the Russian Revolution of 1917, the Chinese Revolution of the 1940s, the Cuban Revolution of 1959, the Iranian Revolution of 1979 and the East European Revolutions of 1989 followed by the collapse of the Soviet Union.

The majority of these upheavals began as righteous struggles against tyranny – but later devolved for an extended period into vicious internecine rivalry. The Reign of Terror following the French Revolution and the rivalries between political factions during the Russian Revolution and subsequent civil war were perhaps the worst examples. Only the American Revolution and the East European Revolutions were spared. Although even the American experience eventually suffered through a civil war; and the Native Americans and enslaved Africans didn't fare well at all.

The events of the Exodus certainly can be described as a revolution – albeit with the Divine Intercessor playing the decisive role. The Israelites left Egypt and after 50 days, on Shavuot, received the Ten Words – often called Ten Commandments and the Torah – at Mt. Sinai. With Moses shepherding them through the wilderness, the Israelites were mostly insulated from surrounding peoples. Over 40 years, the people were taught the Torah and in a manner of speaking became distilled to be transformed, from an enslaved people pining for the "flesh pots in Egypt", to an independent self-assured nation, capable of pursuing its destiny.

To be sure, there were incidents of backsliding as when many were drawn into the rebellion of Korah, Dathan and Abiram. Nor was that the only incidence in our long history. During the late 2<sup>nd</sup> Temple period, rivalries between priestly families, political factions, Sadducees, Pharisees, and Sicarri paralleled the factional strife during the French and Russian Revolutions. The result, the rabbis teach, was Sinat Chinum (Causeless Hatred) which led to the destruction of the Temple. We pay the price for that to this day when we recite on the three Festivals "On account of our sins we were exiled."

This year Shavuot begins on the evening of Sunday May 16 and continues to sundown on May 18. We are planning joint services with Beth Am to be held at BHBI and also through Zoom. Yizkor services will be included. See the calendar in this Bulletin for the times and locations.

We will hold our Annual Meeting through Zoom on May 16 at 3:00 PM. It is very important that you ALL attend because we need a quorum to conduct business. The Board of Trustees has voted to recommend an amendment to our Constitution to reduce the required minimum number of Trustees to nine, including five officers. We will send all members a formal notification through email including the proposed amendment to our Constitution for the members to vote upon. Please look for the email and be sure to attend.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 pound farmer cheese
- 3 large eggs
- 3 tablespoon sour cream
- 2 teaspoon vanilla sugar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 tablespoon potato starch
- Oil or nonstick cooking spray, for frying

#### **PREPARATION**

In a medium bowl, combine the farmer cheese, eggs, sour cream, sugars, and potato starch. Mix well. Heat oil or cooking spray in a skillet over medium heat. Scoop a ladle of the pancake mixture into the pan. Fry until golden, approximately 1-2 minutes per side.
