July's Vice President's Message

Friends,

The June President's message concerned the recent fighting between Israel and Hamas in the Gaza strip. The focus of the message was to criticize the New York Times for its supposed biased reporting. I urge you to read the two articles^{1,2} that were cited, you might come away with a different impression.

To focus on the perceived biases of the NY Times is a distraction from the more serious picture. Our congregational President has invited others to express their views, so I will express mine. The recent conflict between Israel and Hamas was horrific. Thousands of rockets were fired indiscriminately at Israel, resulting in a dozen civilian deaths, including two children, several foreign workers, and two Israeli Arab citizens. Thousands more were traumatized. Precision-targeted counter attacks on Gaza nevertheless resulted in a death toll 20 times greater, including numerous civilians, among them reportedly 66 children. Unfortunately this was only the latest in a series of such exchanges (2008, 2012, 2014, 2019, and now 2021). Indeed, the Israeli euphemism for such periodic exchanges of fire with Gaza is "mowing the grass."

One should ask why this continues. Certainly a primary cause is Hamas' stated dedication to Israel's destruction. However, as Paul Harvey used to say, here is the *rest of the story* (or at least a part of it). The source of much of Hamas' funding in recent years has been suitcases of money from Qatar, being delivered to Gaza with the full cooperation of the Israeli government. Why does Israel do this? The short answer is that it is intended to prevent economic collapse, and resulting instability, in Gaza. But to quote from a Jerusalem Post article³ of March 12, 2019, "Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu defended Israel's regular allowing of Qatari funds to be transferred into Gaza, saying it is part of a broader strategy to keep Hamas and the Palestinian Authority separate, a source in Monday's Likud faction meeting said. . . . The prime minister also said that, 'whoever is against a Palestinian state should be for' transferring the funds to Gaza, because maintaining a separation between the PA in the West Bank and Hamas in Gaza helps prevent the establishment of a Palestinian state." A May 16, 2021 column⁴ in the Israeli newspaper Haaretz reports, "In an interview with the Ynet website on May 5, 2019, a close associate of the prime minister, Maj. Gen. (res.) Gershon Hacoen, said that 'the truth must be stated: Netanyahu's strategy is to prevent a two-state option, so he has made Hamas his closest partner. Overtly, Hamas is the enemy. Covertly, it's an ally.'"

In short, the continuing cycle of violence between Israel and Hamas has been due not just to the intransience of Hamas, it has also been a consequence of the policy of the Israeli government to preserve the status quo rather than make efforts to resolve the broader conflict. One often hears from the Israeli side that there is "no partner for peace." But one should remember that the relative quiet that has prevailed in the West Bank for the last many years is in large part due to the close cooperation between the security forces of the governing Palestinian Authority (PA) and their Israeli counterparts. I have sometimes heard it claimed that this cooperation exists only for the cynical purposes of the PA.

SERVICES



Whatever the reasons, one should not denigrate the fact that this cooperation has saved countless Israeli lives.

The goal of the Biden administration to channel funding for the reconstruction of Gaza through the PA, as a means to strengthen the PA and weaken Hamas, is therefore a step in the right direction. One can only hope that the new Israeli government will act similarly to strengthen the PA. A more in-depth discussion of this issue can be found in a recent column⁵ by the Israel Policy Forum, which I urge you to read, and also a more recent article⁶ in the online journal Fathom.

For those interested in understanding the triggers that set off the recent round of violence, I suggest this analysis⁷ by the Israel Policy Forum and this article⁸ from the NY Times.

This month on July 17/18 we will observe Tisha B'Av, when we mourn for the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem; the first time by the Babylonians, the second time by the Romans. The Rabbis of the Talmud attributed⁹ the destruction of the First Temple to the high rate of idolatry, sexual immorality and bloodshed. They attributed⁹ the destruction of the Second Temple to *sinat chinam* (causeless hatred). Rather than place the blame on the greater strength of the Babylonian and Roman armies and on the evil intents of those empires, the Rabbis turned inwards, to consider how the behavior of the people led G-d to bring such calamities. While I am not a fan of second guessing G-d's intentions, we would similarly be wise not to reserve all our attention and wrath for our implacable enemies, be they Hamas or be they the NY Times. We should rather look for ways that both the Israeli government, and we advocating in the US, can work towards peace and a better future for both Israel and its neighbors.


