

#### December's President's Message

Friends,

As this letter is delivered to you, we continue to celebrate Chanukah which began on November 28 and continues to December 6<sup>th</sup>. The events which led to the first Chanukah parallel some of the controversies among Jews in modern times.

The Persians defeated the Babylonian empire and allowed – even encouraged – many Jews to return to Eretz Yisroel (Land of Israel) after their exile. Persian rule was somewhat benign and the returning Jews were given sanction to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem. Indeed the later prophets rebuked the people for being lethargic in the reconstruction. Even after the 2<sup>nd</sup> Temple was rebuilt, the very last prophet, Malachi, sharply criticized the lackadaisical attitude and relaxed way that the services were conducted in the Temple. He castigated the priests for calling their duties "wearisome."

A large portion of the Jewish population remained in Babylon and became quite comfortable, prospering in their exile. In Judah and Samaria, we have sparse information up until the conquest by Alexander when the Macedonian Greeks took control from Persia. After Alexander's death, Judah was ruled by the Ptolemaic kingdom. Later, around 200 BCE, the Seleucid kingdom defeated the Ptolemies. The interaction with the Greeks was complex; many Jews embraced the Hellenist culture and were attracted to its art and philosophy. Some went as far as indulging in the gymnasiums and as was customary with the Greeks, participated naked in the sporting events.

That behavior and other examples of adopting Greek practices offended "traditional" Jews. Later, the Seleucids under Antiochus IV Epiphanes instituted increasing restrictions on Jewish practice, including prohibiting Shabbat observance, kashrut and circumcision. One account mentions that a statue of Zeus was placed in the Temple. When a Jew agreed to sacrifice a pig, the Hasmoneon priest Mattityahu slew him. His sons, called Maccabees, led a successful rebellion which lasted from 168 to 164 BCE at which time the Temple was cleansed, rededicated and the Menorah burned miraculously for eight days with only one day's supply of oil.

The war with the Greeks lasted another 20 years with intermittent victories and defeats. The noble character of the Maccabees did not carry over to their descendants who took on Greek names such as John Hyrcanus and Aristobulus. There were rivalries and internecine bloodshed. Still later, the Romans and the Idumean Herod supplanted the remaining Hasmoneans to oppressively rule Judah - oblivious to the pious sensitivities of the population. The rivalry between the Sadducees and Pharisees contributed to internal strife with "hateful speech" and "causeless hatred". That is what the rabbis assert was a principle cause for the destruction of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Temple.

There are lessons our history provides for the present.

When some of our fellow Jews take a more traditional or orthodox, even "ultra-orthodox" observance of our faith – the "black hats" – we might consider how their sensibilities are like those of the

Perhaps the real miracle of Chanukah is, that the middle of a dystopian era like the present, a brief victory so long ago accompanied by a candelabra which inexplicably burned for eight days could still inspire and bring joy to so many.


