

April's President's Message

Friends,

Each week at Shabbat Services we read the Prayer for the State of Israel. With all the political troubles happening lately in Israel, there has been a movement in some congregations to either do away with saying that prayer, or to substitute it with one that expresses the worries and concerns arising from the direction the current Israeli government is taking. I am not a proponent of this movement. To me, this prayer is more important now than ever. In our prayer we ask G-d, with reference to the State of Israel, to "Shield it with Your love; spread over it the shelter of Your peace. Guide its leaders and advisors with Your light and Your truth. Help them with Your good counsel." Never before have the leaders of Israel been in greater need of divine light, truth, and good counsel, because they are currently leading Israel on a path to destruction. The prayer continues, "Strengthen the hands of those who defend our Holy Land. Deliver them; crown their efforts with triumph." One might be tempted to think of this strictly in terms of military defense. I prefer to think of the *defenders of Israel*, not just as the soldiers of the IDF, but as all who work to keep Israel as the country that was envisioned in its Declaration of Independence, "it will foster the development of the country for the benefit of all its inhabitants; it will be based on freedom, justice and peace as envisaged by the prophets of Israel; it will ensure complete equality of social and political rights to all its inhabitants irrespective of religion, race or sex; it will guarantee freedom of religion, conscience, language, education and culture." This means all of us. The prayer ends, "Bless the land with peace, and its inhabitants with lasting joy," -- all its inhabitants. To that I willingly say Amen.

As I indicated in my message last month, the current Israeli government is acting to destroy democracy in the country. Israel does not enjoy the many checks and balances on government that we have in the US. Israel lacks a formal constitution. Israel has a parliamentary system, which essentially means the executive and legislative branches are the same; there are no presidential vetoes as the Prime Minister controls the governing coalition in the legislature. Israel has a single house of the legislature, the Knesset, not as in the US where two separate houses must both agree to pass a law. Elections for the Knesset are national elections where people vote for a single party slate, not as in the US where people vote for local representatives who then need to work together to balance differing local interests. In Israel, the sole check and balance on the actions of the Knesset is the judicial system, and in particular the Supreme Court. The current government is seeking to pass legislation that will allow the Knesset to overturn any decision of the Supreme Court by mere majority vote. In short, the Knesset will be able to pass and enforce any law the majority coalition wishes. There are some who argue that democracy will remain; the people can always vote out the government at the next election. But a government that enjoys total power will seek to maintain its power. It can tweak election laws to its advantage, and it can exert influence over the media to present a propagandized perspective to its citizens (the Communications Minister has already begun working on this latter strategy). This is the path that has been taken by countries such as Turkey, Hungary, and Poland. To anyone who thinks this could not happen in Israel, just consider what is going on in our own country. In memory of Marian Gulack Steve and Helen Gulak In memory of Max Block Cathy Block This is not a matter of left-wing vs right-wing, nor secular vs religious. It transcends differences in political viewpoint. This is a matter of democracy vs autocracy. This is why there has been an unprecedented taking to the streets of hundreds of thousands of ordinary Israelis protesting each week (now in its 12th week). These judicial reforms have been opposed by former heads of the Mossad, the Shin Bet, security chiefs, and national security advisers; top Israeli economists, Israeli Nobel Prize winners, Israeli academics and university heads. They have been opposed by reservists in the IDF, including those in elite units such as pilots, paratroopers, intelligence, and cyber security, who have threatened not to report for duty. Yet the judicial legislation has been pushed forward, with the goal of being competed before Passover, by a Prime Minister who is willing to risk the security and prosperity of the country for the sake of protecting himself against the charges of bribery, fraud, and breach of trust for which he is currently standing trial. The situation was so grave that the current Chief of the IDF, Herzi Halevi, the Minister of Defense, Yoav Gallant, and the head of the Shin Bet (the internal security service), Ronen Bar, warned Netanyahu about the impending security dangers if the legislation moved forward. When Gallant came out publically calling for a pause in the legislative efforts, Netanyahu fired him. The resulting spontaneous eruption of protests, an impending strike by the national labor organization Histadrut which shut down departures at Ben Gurion airport, the announcement of a shut down by the heads of Israel's research universities, and other strikes and protests, finally persuaded Netanyahu last Monday to announce a pause in his judicial "reform" efforts until after the holidays. In order to get him to agree to this pause, Netanyahu had to promise his Minister of National Security Ben-Gvir, the Kahanist admirer of Baruch Goldstein and who was exempted from service in the army because of his extremist views, that he would become head of a newly constituted National Guard. What happens next? Stay tuned. If any of you feel I have breached my conviction to steer clear of politics in this Bulletin, I will follow the policy of my predecessor and offer this space next month to anyone who wishes to express a different point of view.

Meanwhile, back on the home front, Passover will begin this month, with the first seder on Wednesday, April 5. You should have all received from me by email a form to sell your chametz before the holiday. The form is also posted on the shul website. If you wish to make use of this form, you must sign it and get it to the shul, either by mail or by scanning and sending by email, by 5 pm Monday April 3. First day morning service, Thursday April 6, and eighth day morning service with yizkor, Thursday April 13, will be held jointly with Temple Beth Am at BHBI. Unlike previously, Temple Beth David has decided not to join us this year, and services hosted by Temple Beth Am will take place jointly with Temple Beth El at Beth El. And speaking of Israel, this month will also see several community wide events. There will be a community concert in honor of Israel's 75 birthday on Thursday, April 20, at 7:30 pm at the Eastman Theater. On Monday, April 24th at 7 - 8:30 pm there will be a Yom HaZikaron (Israeli Memorial Day) ceremony at the JCC. And on Wednesday, April 26th at 5:50 - 7:30 pm there will be a Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israel Independence Day) celebration at the JCC.
