August's President's Message

Friends,

It has been a while since I updated you on the ongoing situation in Israel. This past week the Knesset enacted into law the first of a series of bills intended to weaken the power of the judicial system, in particular the Supreme Court. To those who support these measures, they are intended to shift power from unelected judges to elected political representatives, and to break the power of entrenched elites. To those who oppose these measures, they claim they will eliminate the power of the courts to serve as a check on the actions of the executive and legislative branches, transfer all power to the governing coalition, and so threaten the personal freedoms and minority rights expected in a democracy. The bill that was enacted eliminates the "Reasonableness Doctrine," by which the Supreme Court can review, and block, administrative decisions and appointments made by elected officials that are judged to be "unreasonable in the extreme." The Reasonableness Doctrine does not apply to legislative actions. Examples of its use include a 2007 ruling requiring the government to fortify all (rather than only some) school classrooms in the Gaza border region, and a 2014 ruling against a municipal council's decision not to build a mikveh for its religious population. But it is ironic that two of the most contentious uses of Reasonableness involved the same Israeli politician, Aryeh Deri, leader of the Sephardi religious party Shas. In a recent case from last January, the Supreme Court ruled 10-1 against the current right-wing Netanyahu government to require the firing of Interior Minister and Health Minister Deri, due to Deri's prior criminal convictions and his commitment to quit politics as part of a plea bargain for tax fraud in 2022. One of the earliest cases was in 1993, when the Supreme Court invoked Reasonableness against the leftwing Rabin government, requiring Rabin to immediately fire Interior Minister Deri, once it was known that Deri was about to be indicted (later convicted) on charges of bribery. Rabin had been counting on the 6 Knesset seats from Shas to support passage of the Oslo Accords, and so had tried to delay firing Deri until after the indictment was filed (and after the Oslo Accords were approved). With Deri fired, Shas left Rabin's coalition leaving Rabin with only 56 seats in his coalition (61 is required for a majority). The Oslo Accords were ultimately passed when political horse trading caused three members of the opposition to join Rabin's coalition, and the 5 votes from Arab parties outside the coalition gave their support. Passage of the bill eliminating the Reasonableness Doctrine sparked massive <u>protests</u> throughout Israel. A recent <u>poll</u> found that 28% of Israelis are considering to leave the country. A WhatsApp group of medical workers seeking advice on <u>relocation</u> abroad attracted 3,000 new members. Most concerning has been the increasing number (now more than 10,000) of <u>reservists</u> in the Israeli Defense Forces, particularly in key positions such as Air Force pilots, cyber intelligence, and elite commando units, who have announced that they will no longer show up for voluntary training and duty, thus threatening combat readiness.
