February's President's Message

Friends,

This year is a Jewish Leap Year, and so we have both Adar I and Adar II. In a leap year, Purim occurs in Adar II, and so Purim is "late" this year, falling in March. The reason why Jewish holidays can be "late" or "early" is because the Hebrew calendar is based on the lunar cycle, in which each of the 12 months begins with the new moon and so lasts 29 or 30 days. Adding these up, the year would fall short compared to the solar year by about 11 days, so a leap year must be added in 7 out of every 19 years to keep the lunar and solar calendars in sync. If we did not have such leap years, then Jewish holidays would shift by 11 days each year, and so would gradually shift with respect to the seasons fixed by the solar cycle, as is the case with the Islamic calendar. But since the Torah specifies that certain holidays must be synced to specific agricultural cycles (wheat harvest, barley harvest, etc.), this cannot be allowed to happen, hence the introduction of leap years!

While the need for a leap year was realized in ancient times (perhaps as early as 2000 BCE), the system for adding leap years to the Hebrew calendar was standardized in the fourth century by Hillel II using a method based on mathematical and astronomical calculations. The lengths of each month were fixed to alternate between 29 and 30 days, with a 30-day leap month (Adar I) added in the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th, and 19th years of a 19-year cycle (we are currently in the 8th year of such a cycle; our last leap year was in 2022). Further tweaks to the calendar (affecting the lengths of the months of Cheshvan and Kislev) are needed so that Yom Kippur does not fall adjacent to Shabbat, and so Hoshanah Rabba does not fall on Shabbat.

The need to standardize the calendar arose from Roman persecutions, which ultimately forbade the meeting of the Great Sanhedrin (the Rabbinic governing body in ancient Israel) which, among other duties, was responsible for declaring the start of new months. The adoption of the calendar according to Hillel II was approved by a clandestine meeting of the Sanhedrin in 358 CE, and was the last universal decision made by the Great Sandedrin before it ceased to function.

The upshot of all this? This year you have a whole extra month to prepare your Purim costume!






